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Washington D.C. --- Fourth District Congressman Nick J. Rahall, (D-WV), is urging residents of southern West Virginia to participate in a "grassroots investigation" of the federal regulatory process by calling the Forum on Regulation (FOR) Telethon.

Rahall pointed out that, "West Virginia can express their opinions by calling FOR's Toll-Free number (800-368-8050), Sept. 12 and 13 between noon and 4pm E.D.T. A total of 25 toll-free telephone lines will be available to callers anywhere in the continential United States.

Congressman Rahall will be one of the several panelists monitoring the phones in Washington during the two-day session. He will be joined by other Members of Congress, leading regulatory officials, representatives of the academic community, as well as spokesmen for a broad range of private and public interests.

Congressman Rahall will be answering calls from noon to 1 pm on Wednesday, Sept. 13.

"The purpose of this effort," Rahall explained, "is to involve the broadest possible cross-section of the American people in determing what's working, what isn't and why."

Rahall went on to say, "This telethon carries through on a strong belief I have, to bring the people more in touch with the government and how it operates."

Callers will be asked to respond to a special questionnaire to determine an overall reading of opinion on the subject. Results will be tabulated immediately after the program is completed, and present to top decision-makers." (SAMPLE IS ATTACHED)
