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WASHINGTON D.C. --- WEST VIRGINIA'S FOURTH DISTRICT CONGRESSMAN NICK J. RAHALL, SAID, "IT IS IMPERATIVE AT THIS TIME THAT A COHERENT NATIONAL COAL POLICY BE DEVELOPED AT THE EARLIEST FEASIBLE
TIME", IN A LETTER TO ENERGY SECRETARY JAMES SCHLESINGER.

RAHALL, THE U.S. REPRESENTATIVE FOR ONE OF THE LARGEST COAL

PRODUCING REGIONS IN THE COUNTRY, CHARGED, "IT IS CLEAR THAT THE PRE
SENT FEDERAL EFFORT GEARED TO INCREASED COAL PRODUCTION AND UTILIZA
TION IS NOT AGGRESSIVE ENOUGH NOR IS IT BEING COORDINATED SUFFICIENTLY."

"GIVEN THE SERIOUSNESS OF THIS NATION'S PRESENT NATIONAL SECURITY POSITION, I WOULD EXPECT THAT BOTH SHORT-TERM AND LONGER-RANGE
COAL POLICY OPTIONS WOULD BE RECEIVING HIGHER PRIORITY WITHIN THE
ENERGY DEPARTMENT AND AMONG THE APPROPRIATIE FEDERAL AGENCIES,"
THE CONGRESSMAN WENT ON TO SAY.

RAHALL POINTED OUT, "FROM 1962 TO 1970, COAL PRODUCTION IN-CREASED FROM 403 MILLION TONS PER YEAR TO 603 MILLION TONS. DESPITE THE RECENT EMPHASIS UPON COAL AND ITS SUBSTITUTION FOR OIL AND GAS, ANNUAL PRODUCTION HAD ONLY INCREASED TO APPROXIMATELY 620 MILLION TONS BY 1977."

CONGRESSMAN RAHALL OBSERVED THAT, "IT IS EVIDENT THAT IF THIS TREND CONTINUES, THE COAL PRODUCTION OBJECTIVE OF THE NATIONAL ENERGY PLAN FOR 1985 OF 1 TO 1.2 BILLION TONS, WILL NOT BE MET."

RAHALL REQUESTED THAT SECRETARY SCHLESINGER PROVIDE IN-FORMATION RELATIVE TO:

- -CURRENT BUDGET OBLIGATIONS AND PROJECTIONS FOR COAL EXTRACTION,
 CONVERSION AND TRANSPORTATION.
- -SUMMARY OF KEY RESPONSIBILITIES OF EACH FEDERAL AGENCY DEALING WITH COAL, AND DOCUMENTATION OF THEIR POLICY.
- -CURRENT COAL PRODUCTION TARGETS AND PLANS.
- -ESTIMATE OF BUDGET EXPENDITURES IN THE AREA OF SYNFUEL USE FROM 1985 TO 1990.

CONGRESSMAN RAHALL RECENTLY SAID ON THE HOUSE FLOOR, THAT THE GOVERNMENT'S ENERGY POLICY WAS CAUSING "CHAOS" IN THE COAL INDUSTRY.
