Late last September, it was brought to my attention that the MSHA Field Office in Logan, West Virginia, was not able to complete the mandated number of inspections due to a shortage of qualified mine inspectors.

At my request, the General ACcounting Office will soon being a major investigation into MSHA's operation and why they have seemingly become lax in their responsiblity to protect the nation's coal miners.

I welcome this investigation and anxiously await the results, knowing that miners and their families will benefit from this action.
