STATEMENT OF CONGRESSMAN NICK J. RAHALL, (D-4th)

Good afternoon and thank you for coming.

In less than a week, West Virginians, as well as all Americans, have a decision to make. A very important decision. Next Tuesday, November 4, is election day, and the American people will be called upon to select their leaders for the coming years.

In our great State, the citizens will not only elect a president, they will elect a governor, and in this the 2nd Congressional District, they will elect a new congressman.

That is my reason for coming to Morgantown today. First—to urge all registered voters to go to the polls on November 4, and make their voice heard, and secondly—to urge the support of a fine Democratic ticket headed by Gov. Rockefeller, and in this Congressional District by State Senator Pat Hamilton.

The significance of each person's vote is magnified, I believe, by these few facts: in 1960, John F. Kennedy was elected president by a margin of less than one vote per precinct; and in 1976, a switch of only 10,000 votes in Ohio and Hawaii would have given Jerry Ford a victory over President Carter.

In many regions of the world, free and open elections are not even heard of. But yet this year, many Americans will miss an opportunity to lay their claim on the future of this Nation and State. For our's to truly be a government of the people and by the people, each one of us must vote next Tuesday.

In the 22 counties that make up the 2nd Congressional District, voters have the unique opportunity to select a man to serve as the Federal Government's closest representative to them. A congressman is just that.

There have been numerous political advertisments this election year, that have urged voters to return the power of Congress to the Republicans, but West Virginians are well aware of the benefits that have come to this State because of a complete Democratic Congressional Delegation—from Senators Byrd and Randolph, to the four Democratic Congressmen, Congressmen Mollohan, Hutchinson, myself, and Harley O. Staggers.

The people of the 2nd District, know more than anyone else, about the dedicated service their Democratic Congressman Harley Staggers has provided for 32 years.
