W. VA. PROGRAMS FUNDED BY CONGRESS

WASHINGTON D.C. --- WEST VIRGINIA'S FOURTH DISTRICT CONGRESS-MAN NICK J. RAHALL, HAS REPORTED THAT CONGRESS APPROVED FUNDING FOR A NUMBER OF PROGRAMS FOR WEST VIRGINIA IN THE FINAL DAYS OF THE 1982 SESSION.

"OF UTMOST IMPORTANCE TO THE GROWING NUMBER OF UNEMPLOYED COAL MINERS IN SOUTHERN WEST VIRGINIA," RAHALL POINTED OUT, "IS THE AP-PROPRIATION OF \$162.2 MILLION TO HIRE OUT-OF-WORK COAL MINERS AND CONSTRUCTION WORKERS TO RECLAIM ABANDONED COAL MINE SITES."

"THIS FIGURE REPRESENTS AN INCREASE OF \$34 MILLION TO THE PRO-POSAL TO PUT COAL MINERS BACK TO WORK THAT I OFFERED IN THE HOUSE," CONGRESSMAN RAHALL STATED.

ON ANOTHER ISSUE OF IMPORTANCE TO SOUTHERN WEST VIRGINIA, CON-GRESSMAN RAHALL EXPLAINED THAT, "CONTAINED IN THE CONTINUING APPROPRI-ATIONS MEASURE WAS \$16.4 MILLION FOR THE MUCH-NEEDED FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT IN THE TUG FORK VALLEY."

"MANY OF MY COLLEAGUES REFER TO SUCH EXPENDITURES AS 'PORK-BAR-RELL', BUT TO THEM I SAY, 'COME TO MINGO COUNTY DURING A FLOOD, AND YOU WILL NOT CALL THIS FUNDING A PORK-BARRELL PROJECT,'" RAHALL STRESSED.

THE FIGURE OF FUNDING FOR THE TUG FORK PROJECT, RAHALL POINTED OUT, "ALSO REPRESENTS AN INCREASE OF \$8 MILLION, AN INCREASE I WORKED FOR BEING WELL AWARE OF THE NEED FOR LONG-TERM FLOOD PROECTION FOR THE RESIDENTS OF THAT REGION,"
