NEWS FROM CONGRESSMAN NICK RAHALL

Washington, D.C. -- Fourth District Rep. Nick Rahall (D-WV) today announced his participation in a number of efforts to ensure full funding for Social Security Cost Of Living Adjustments (COLA) and to ensure that funding for the Appalachian Regional Commission are both included when the conferees for the House and Senate meet to iron out the differences between the two budgets passed by both bodies of Congress.

Congressman Rahall signed a letter to all House Conferees as well as the Budget Chairmen of both bodies of Congress urging them to uphold the position as passed by the House of Representatives that full cost of living increases should be paid as scheduled to all eligible Social Security recipients. "I feel that the Social Security system represents a contract entered into by the American people and their government. Any tampering with this system would consitute a breach of that contract," Rep. Rahall pointed out. Congressman Rahall is a member of the Social Security Caucus and the COLA Coalition in the House of Representatives.

Congressman Rahall also sent a letter to all House Budget Conferees urging them to uphold the provision in the House-passed budget providing \$134 million in new budget authority for the Appalachian Regional Commission. "The A.R.C. is a vital source of development in West Virginia, of jobs, and of sustenance. We cannot afford to have the A.R.C. fall under the President's budget knife," Rep. Rahall said. "Some of our most-travelled roads would be left uncompleted should funding for A.R.C. be cut abruptly."

Congressman Rahall also announced the winners in the Congressional Art Competition's Fourth District contest of "An Artisitic Discovery." In the competition among area high school students, "Watching--Waiting--Coal Country, West Virginia" by Jan Clarkson, a 17-year-old senior at Bluefield High School, was chosen to represent the Fourth District in the exhibition in the U.S. Capitol. In the category of Special Education, "Cherry Blossoms" by Pam Harrison of East Beckley High School was judged as the winner. Pam lives in Harper, West Virginia. "I salute these talented young artists as well as all other participants in the Congressional Art Competition. I am proud to see the works from our area hanging in the U.S. Capitol and I hope that all West Virginians visiting Washington will go see the exhibition," Rep. Rahall said.

Dear :

I would like to take this opportunity to invite high school students in my Congressional district to participate in a nationwide Congressional Art Competition again this year. The competition is part of An Artistic Discovery, a nationwide activity initiated by members of the House of Representatives to recognize and encourage the creative talents of young Americans. It is also my pleasure this year to invite handicapped students of all ages to participate in a similar type of competion which is unique to the fourth Congressional district of West Virginia.

It is my hope that you will take part in these competitions by encouraging your art and special education instructors to assist students who wish to participate in the competition in following the guidelines set below, as established by the Congressional Arts Caucus.

Each student who enters will receive a letter of recognition, and four second place entries from both the traditional and specialized competitions will be selected for display in my district offices. I will submit the winning entry from my district in the nationwide competition for possible selection for display in the National Exhibition; this Exhibition will be located in a corridor leading to the United States Capitol. The winning entry in the specialized competition will be proudly displayed in the reception area of my Washington, D.C. office. Should the winning entry from the traditional competition not be selected for the National Exhibition, it will be prominently displayed, along with the specialized winner in my Washington office. Ten entries will be exhibited during the month of May at each of the following locations: the Raleigh County Public Library in Beckley for Raleigh and Wyoming counties; the Flat Top National Bank in Bluefield for Mercer and McDowell counties; the Cabell County Public Library in Huntington for Cabell and Wayne counties; and the Southwestern Community College (Logan Campus) for Logan and Mingo counties.

The guidelines for the nationwide competition have been set as follows:

- 1. The competition will be open to high school students, grades 9 through 12. One entry per art teacher from each school will be accepted. Judging each school's winning entry will be left to the discretion of the individual art teacher.
- 2. Art work must be two dimensional, no larger than 30 inches by 30 inches (unframed), and within the following categories:

-- Paintings - oils, acrylics, etc.

-- Drawings - watercolors and pastels

--Collages

- --Prints lithographs, silk screens, memotypes, wood cuts, and intaglio methods.
- 3. Entries should be unframed, but matted.
- 4. Subject matter is left to the discretion of the artist.
- 5. Each entry should be labeled with the artist's name, address, age, grade, title of entry and medium, school and address, and teacher.
- 6. Entries must be received on, or before, May 3, 1985, at the following locations:

Raleigh and Wyoming counties: Congressman Nick Rahall's Office, Bair Building, Beckley, WV 25801.

Mercer and McDowell counties: Congressman Nick Rahall's Office, 1005 Federal Building, Bluefield, WV 24701.

Cabell and Wayne counties: Congressman Nick Rahall's Office, 815 Fifth Avenue, Huntington, WV 25701.

Logan and Mingo counties: Congressman Nick Rahall's Office, R.K. Building, Logan, WV 25601.

7. My office and the various participants will exercise usual care in the handling of entries, but we cannot assume liability for accidents in transit, handling or display. Please be certain that submitted works are not so fragile as to present difficulty in handling or display.

The competition for special education students will follow the same guidelines, however, it is open to students of all age groups.

It is requested that all works be picked up following the exhibition after May 30th and prior to September 15, 1985, at my district offices. The art works will be transferred to my office nearest your school and they may be picked up there at your convenience.

If you have any questions regarding this matter, please contact one of my district offices. I look forward to your participation in the Congressional Art Competition.

Dear Secretary Heckler:

On behalf of the citizens of West Virginia, we are writing to urge you to grant the State's request to renew its Medicaid Home and Community Based Waiver Program. In recent weeks, each of us has contacted you or a member of your staff to bring this request to your attention. We now join together in this letter to demonstrate the importance that we attach to this program and to your agency's decision making process regarding its continuation.

As you know, West Virginia's Department of Human Services has been informed that the Health Care Financing Administration intends to recommend that you deny the extension request. We are surprised and disturbed by this recommendation for a number of reasons. In particular, we feel that such a denial would be an unfair response to West Virginia's documented commitment to the goals of the Medicaid Waiver and to implementing the program in full compliance with federal, legal and programmatic requirements. We, frankly, feel that HCFA has made it difficult for the State to obtain a positive review of the waiver request. But we would rather not dwell on the past, and at this point seek your involvement in order to proceed in a more satisfactory manner.

We hope that you agree with us that the State deserves further consideration from HHS. The State has attempted in the past few months to respond to HCFA's findings of certain program deficiencies in its current waiver program by submitting plans of correction. It also has welcomed the input and assistance of HCFA in developing a plan for the waiver extension that meets in full the expectations of the federal government. In other words, West Virginia is anxious to be cooperative and helpful in order to continue a program that is of great importance to the people of our State.

We understand that HHS may grant a state an extension of its existing waiver for a determined amount of time to permit the state to document more fully that it has satisfied, and will continue to satisfy, statutory and regulatory requirements needed to approve another three year waiver. Therefore, we ask for your approval of a request for six months, the amount of time the State views as adequate to enable HCFA to fully review the previously mentioned plans of correction and other documents that may still be requested by HCFA.

In closing, we wish to underscore the level of commitment we have for this waiver program. Congress authorized the waiver in order to give the states a critical tool to assist a small portion of Americans to stay out of institutions and to achieve the resultant cost savings and other important benefits. West Virginia has an impressive track record of using the waiver to provide quality care to certain disabled and elderly citizens, and reports success in reaching the results that Congress hoped for. We seek your assistance in recognizing the State's performance and in enabling it to continue, with necessary alternations made, a program that has such a positive impact on everyone.

Please know that we are fully committed to this program. Contact us immediately if we can be of further help. We hope to hear from you soon about your decision, and are confident that a mutually satisfactory arrangement can be worked out to ensure the continuation of the waiver in West Virginia.

Dear House Budget Conferee:

The House-passed budget resolution provides \$134 million in new budget authority for the Appalachian Regional Commission in fiscal year 1986--a 10 percent decrease from the 1985 level.

We are writing to urge you to support the House position on funding for the ARC in the budget conference committee. As representatives from the Appalachian region we strongly oppose the Senate-passed budget resolution which would provide no budget authority for the ARC in fiscal year 1986.

With ARC assistance, we have made great strides toward bringing the Appalachian region into the mainstream of American economic life. ARC assistance has helped to transform the dismal picture of Appalachia drawn in the 1960s into a portrait of hope and achievement in the 1980s. But the picture is not yet complete. The ARC Governors have prepared a program to integrate the Appalachian region into the mainstream of the national economy, and the House-passed budget resolution provides the funds that we need to continue our efforts toward that end.

The flurry of economic activity generated by ARC assisted projects has resulted in new tax revenues for federal, state and local governments, revenues in excess of the modest investment we have made in the ARC during the past 20 years. The ARC makes economic sense for Appalachia and the nation as we work to enhance economic development and ease the federal deficit dilemna.

Your assistance in this matter will be appreciated.
