BOARD OF REGENTS RECEIVES GRANT FROM DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

WASHINGTON, DC - U.S. Rep. Nick Rahall announces that the U.S.

Department of Education has awarded the West Virginia Board of Regents over \$130,000 for its teacher scholarship program.

In West Virginia, the \$130,106 will be awarded to 26 students who qualify for the program, which Rahall outlines.

"The full appropriation is to be used to provide scholarships to enable and encourage outstanding high school graduates to pursue teaching careers at the preschool, elementary, or secondary school level," Rahall said. "To receive its allotment, West Virginia had to submit an application for review and approval by the Secretary of Education."

The scholarship assistance amounts to \$5,000 for each year up to for years and are to be awarded only to individuals who ranked in the top ten percent of their high school graduating class.

The Congressional Teacher Scholarship Program is authorized under the Higher Education Act of 1965 and includes 46 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and the Northern Mariana Islands. Individual state allotments are based on a formula comparing each state's population to the aggregate population of all States participating in the program.

APPROVAL OF FY 1987 GRANTS FOR STATE AGENCIES PARTICIPATING IN THE CONGRESSIONAL TEACHER SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Grants to State agencies listed on the following pages have been approved for the Congressional Teacher Scholarship Program's second year of operation (for scholarships for academic year 1987-88). The program is authorized under Title V, Part D, Subpart 1 of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (HEA), as amended by the P.L. 98-558 and 99-498. Grants for Fiscal Year 1987 total \$15.5 million and include 46 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and the Northern Mariana Islands. State allotments are based on a formula comparing each State's population to the aggregate population of all States participating in the program.

The full appropriation is to be used by States to provide scholarships to enable and encourage outstanding high school graduates to pursue teaching careers at the preschool, elementary, or secondary school level. States pay all administrative costs. To receive allotments for scholarships, a State must submit an application for review and approval by the Secretary of Education under the provisions of section 553(b), HEA.

State requirements for administering the program are as follows:

- (1) The agency designated by the State as responsible for administering the program can be either the State agency that administers the State Student Incentive Grant Program or the State agency that administers the Guaranteed Student Loan Program.
- (2) Scholarship assistance amounts to \$5,000 for each year for up to four years, but it cannot exceed the recipient's cost of attendance in any given year.
- (3) Scholarships are to be awarded only to individuals who ranked in the top ten percent of their high school graduating class.
- (4) The scholar selection criteria and procedures used by a State must reflect its needs for preschool, elementary, and secondary school teachers in general as well as any needs it has identified for teachers with training in specific academic disciplines.

- (5) Fiscal control and fund accounting procedures must be adequate for proper disbursement and accounting for Federal funds; and reports must contain information reasonably necessary for the Department to perform its functions.
- (6) The State agency must provide for annual, independent, non-Federal audits of its Congressional Teacher Scholarship Program operations and otherwise satisfy the requirements of the Single Audit Act of 1984 (section 7501 (8), Title 31, USC).

The format used in this Notification Schedule includes: (1) the name and location of the State agency designated to administer the program, and the name of the responsible agency official; (2) the State's Fiscal Year 1987 allotment for awards to students; and (3) the estimated number of students to be aided under the Congressional Teacher Scholarship Program.
