

RAHALL ANNOUNCES LEGISLATIVE WISH LIST FOR 1990

WASHINGTON, DC -- U.S. Rep. Nick J. Rahall (D-W.Va.), recently returned to the nation's capitol for the convening of the Second Session of the 101st Congress. Rahall listed several legislative initiatives he is pursuing in this seesion.

From his subcommittee on Mining and Natural Resources, Rahall will push for the passage of his Coal Heritage Commission for southern West Virginia which will enhance the State's cultural and historical ares involving its coal mining heritage. Another Rahall bill would establish the Town of Bramwell in Mercer County as a National Historic Park, as a unit of the National Park Service.

Rahall will continue his efforts to pass his legislation developing a trout hatchery in McDowell County using abandoned mine waters, supporting an annual production capacity of 25,000 pounds of trout.

Rahall also plans to introduce the "State Fish and Wildlife Assistance Act, which would earmark a portion of federal mineral revenues to states for programs benefiting fish and wildlife.

"The Abandoned Mine Reclamation Act of 1989," which Rahall introduced in the last session will remain a priority in this session. It will provide the resources necessary for the continued reclamation of high priority public health and safety threatening abandoned coal mine sites. This program in the past has made over \$200 million dollars available to West Virginia.

In the area of health, Rahall has introduced the" Area Health Education Center Initiative Act of 1989." This Bill will provide for centers to serve geographic areas which have high numbers of low-income individuals, and those with chronic diseases, such as Black Lung. Rahall hopes Marshall University will base one such center. He has introduced the "Black Lung Benefits Eligibility Clarification Act" which seeks to impose the type of black lung eligibility standard orignally intended by the Congress by reiterating that a claimant can establish a presumption of black lung with a single piece of qualifying evidence.

H.R. 3835, introduced by Rahall directs the heads of all executive departments and agencies of the government to study the possiblility of relocating in rural areas. This would trim the fat away from management and stimulate the economies in areas such as Southern West Virginia.

Finally, Rahall wants to continue to lay the groundwork for reauthorization of the federal highway act up in 1991. and to complete the Appalachian Corridor system.
