WASHINGTON, DC -- U.S. Rep. Nick Rahall (D-WV) announced today that the Clinton administration will be accepting applications for White House Fellowships (WHF) from now until December 1, 1993.

President Lyndon Johnson established the WHF Program in 1964 to give our brightest Americans "a sense of personal involvement in the leadership of the society, a vision of greatness for the society, and a sense of responsibility for bringing that greatness to reality."

The WHF Program provides gifted and highly motivated Americans the opportunity to work for one year as assistants to senior White House staff, the Vice President, Cabinet Officers, and other top-ranking officials. Typical duties of fellows include writing speeches, helping review and draft legislation, answering Congressional inquiries, conducting briefings, evaluating and coordinating major Federal programs. In addition to their work assignments, Fellows meet with a variety of public and private sector leaders to discuss the issues facing the Nation.


The WHF are open to all U.S. citizens except civilian federal government employees; there are no age or educational requirements, and people from all professions are given equal consideration. Candidates are judged on the basis of their academic, athletic, artistic, professional, and other accomplishments. WHF seeks individuals with demonstrated interest in public service and substantial potential for growth as a leaders.

"This is an outstanding opportunity to learn, to cultivate your leadership skills, and serve your county," said Rahall. "I encourage all interested individuals to contact me for more information."
