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**RAHALL DECLARES VICTORY ON
CORPS REORGANIZATION**

WASHINGTON, DC -- U. S. Rep. Nick Rahall (D-W.Va.) declared victory over one of two Clinton proposals which would have implemented a U.S Army Corps of Engineers reorganization adversely affecting the Huntington Army Corps of Engineers District Office.

Rahall's Committee on Public Works and Transportation Committee, which authorizes the Corps of Engineers, today inserted language into the Clinton proposal, The Government Reform and Savings Act of 1993, H.R. 3400, requiring the Corps to submit to Congress for approval any reorganization plan before it can be implemented.

"The Committee's action today assures that before the Corps can proceed with any reorganization of its district offices, the Congress will first have to pass judgement on it. I went to bat for this review and approval process. I am pleased the Committee shared my concerns and acted accordingly, Rahall said."

Recently, the Clinton Administration sent to the Congress, H.R. 3400, which would have allowed the Corps to reorganize its division and district offices nationwide. The bill also implements some of the recommendations of the National Performance Review, the review of government operations Vice President Gore oversaw.

"I will not support any effort to downsize the Corps Huntington district office's operation, Rahall said. I hope the Corps will seek the counsel of employees of the Huntington District Office as well as those of other district offices throughout the country as it attempts a reasonable reorganization."

"The infrastructure needs of our nation are too great to be penciled into little organizational charts on some General's desk in Washington. The reorganization should also take into account the local economic effects of proposed changes in corps operations," Rahall said. "I plan to discuss Marshall University's geotechnical center with the Corps as well."

Rahall is a senior ranking member of the House Public Works and Transportation Committee which will have jurisdiction over any corps reorganization proposal. The full House will consider the bill in the near future.

The Administration also sent to the Hill, the annual administration rescission package which removes the appropriations language Rahall and U.S. Senator Robert C. Byrd helped secure recently which prohibited any funds being used to change the functions of any Corps district offices.

The House Appropriations Committee is expected to act on the rescission package on November 16.

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
