# RAHALL ANNOUNCES HIGHER EDUCATION AID FOR STUDENTS

WASHINGTON, DC -- U.S. Rep. Nick Rahall (D-WV) announced today that the U.S. Department of Education will be providing aid to several thousand students with substantial financial need who will be attending postsecondary institutions in West Virginia.

"Everyone should have the opportunity to seek a college or university education," stated Rahall. "I applaud efforts such as this to make that goal attainable for more West Virginians." This funding will be used to provide grants, low interest loans, and work-study jobs to students demonstrating significant financial need.

West Virginia will receive \$1,474,381 for the Federal Perkins Loan program, \$4,205,587 for the Federal Supplemental Opportunity Grant Program (FSEOG), \$525,707 for the State Student Incentive Grant (SSIG), and \$5,198,782 for the Federal Work-Study (FWS) program.

The U.S. Department of Education estimates that during the period beginning July 1, 1994 and extending through June 30, 1995, 1,016 students attending West Virginia colleges and universities will receive awards through SSIG, 8,638 will receive Perkins loans, 6,781 will get FSEOG grants, and 6,339 will participate in FWS.

The following are some of the West Virginia Institutions slated to receive federal aid for their students: Appalachian Bible College, Bluefield State College, College of West Virginia, Concord College, Huntington Junior College of Business, Huntington School of Beauty Culture, Marshall University, Southern West Virginia Community College, West Virginia Institute of Technology, and West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine.

# APPROVAL OF FY 1994 GRANTS FOR STATE AGENCIES PARTICIPATING IN THE STATE STUDENT INCENTIVE GRANT PROGRAM

Grants to State agencies listed on the following pages have been approved for the State Student Incentive Grant (SSIG) Program's twenty-first year of operation (July 1, 1994, through June 30, 1995). The SSIG Program provides matching funds to encourage the operation of State grant and work-study programs to improve student access and choice in higher education. The program is authorized under Title IV, Part A, Subpart 4 of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (HEA), as added by P.L. 92-318, and amended by P.L. 94-482, P.L. 95-43, P.L. 95-566, P.L. 96-96, P.L. 96-374, P.L. 99-498, P.L. 100-50, and P.L. 102-325. Grants for fiscal year 1994 total \$72.429 million and are awarded to the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin and Pacific Islands. State allotments are based on a formula comparing the number of students deemed eligible to participate in each State's SSIG Program to the aggregate of these eligible students in all States. By statute, no State shall receive less than it received for fiscal year 1979.

States provide grants and work-study jobs to students with substantial financial need to help them attend postsecondary institutions. States pay all administrative costs and match Federal allotments through a direct appropriation of State funds for the program. Funds not used by one State may be reallotted to others in accordance with the allotment formula described above.

To obtain a Federal allotment, a State must have a State agreement pursuant to section 1203 of the HEA and submit an annual application through the State agency administering its program of student grants and workstudy assistance. State program requirements are as follows:

- (1) The program must be administered by a single State agency under section 1203 of the HEA.
- (2) A student grant may not exceed \$5,000 per academic year for attendance on a full-time basis at an institution of higher education. The amount of a grant is reduced for less-than-full-time attendance.
- (3) Recipients are selected on the basis of substantial financial need, determined annually according to criteria established by the State and approved by the Secretary, except that for the purpose of collecting data to make a determination of financial need, no student or parent shall be charged a fee that is payable to an entity other than such
- (4) All nonprofit institutions of higher education in the State must be eligible to participate, except where such participation violates the State's constitution or a State law enacted before October 1, 1978.
- (5) A portion of the grants may go to less-than-full-time students and independent students.
- The matching non-Federal portion of student grants or work-study assistance must represent an additional expenditure over the amount the State spent for student grants or work-study assistance during the second year before entering the SSIG Program.
- (7) Annual matching expenditures under the State's SSIG Program must not be less than the greater of either (a) a dollar-for-dollar match or (b) the average annual aggregate matching expenditures for the preceding three fiscal years or the average annual matching expenditures per full-time equivalent student for those years.

- (8) Fiscal control and funds accounting procedures must be adequate for proper disbursement and accounting for Federal funds, and reports must contain information reasonably necessary for the Department to perform its functions.
- (9) The State agency must provide for audits of its SSIG Program conducted in accordance with 34 CFR 80.26.
- (10) The State agency shall establish procedures to assure that each grantee pursues a course of study at an institution of higher education and that each grantee who is male files, with the institution he plans to attend or is attending, a Statement of Registration status.
- (11) The State agency shall certify that the "principals" responsible for the administration of the SSIG Program are not currently debarred or suspended by any Federal agency in accordance with Executive Order 12549 and 34 CFR 85.
- (12) The State agency shall certify that they administer the SSIG Program in a drug-free workplace in accordance with Pub. L. 100-690 and 34 CFR 85.
- (13) No State agency may use funds from their allotment to perform lobbying activities in accordance with section 319 of P.L. 101-121. For a State agency receiving an allotment of more than \$100,000, the State agency shall also certify that no Federal funds have been paid to individuals to perform lobbying activities and that if other funds have been paid to individuals to perform lobbying activities, the State agency shall disclose that fact.

In keeping with appropriation language, the SSIG allotments are apportioned among States on the same ratio as in FY 1993. All eligible jurisdictions have joined in the State/Federal student assistance delivery system; however, some of the Pacific Island territories may participate under special conditions specified in section 1204, HEA. At a minimum, the \$72.429 million SSIG funds available for FY 1994, when matched with State funds, will provide student awards averaging \$1,035 for about 139,959 needy students. We announce State allotments at this time in order to help the States provide timely notices to student recipients. Federal funds become available to the States for grants to students after June 30, 1994. Later in the program year, all States will report any potentially unused funds, and we will reallot these funds in the spring of 1995 to eligible States which have available matching resources and can use the reallotted funds for awards to needy students before the end of the program year.

The format used in this Notification Schedule includes: (1) the name and location of the State agency designated to administer the program and the name of the responsible agency official; (2) the State's fiscal year 1994 allotment for awards to students; and (3) the estimated number of students to be aided under the State Student Incentive Grant Program during this period.

APPROVAL OF AWARDS TO INSTITUTIONS PARTICIPATING IN THE FEDERAL WORK-STUDY, FEDERAL SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANT, AND FEDERAL PERKINS LOAN PROGRAMS

Awards to institutions listed on the following pages have been approved for the Federal Work-Study, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant and Federal Perkins Loan Programs, authorized under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, for Award Period July 1, 1994, through June 30, 1995. The format of this notification schedule identifies: 1) the name and address of the institution; 2) the amount of the awards for the Federal Perkins Loan Federal share, the FSEOG Federal share and the FWS Federal share; 3) the estimated number of student borrowers in the Federal Perkins Loan Program, the estimated number of student awards for the Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Program and the estimated number of students to be employed under the Federal Work-Study Program for this award period; and 4) the authorized Federal Perkins Loan level of Expenditures.

# FEDERAL WORK-STUDY PROGRAM

Federal funds will provide 75 percent of student payrolls, and a matching college, university or off-campus agency contribution will generally provide the remaining 25 percent, except that the Federal share of earned compensation for employment in private sector for profit jobs may not exceed 50 percent. This schedule contains approval of a total of 3,433 institutional recipients which are estimated to benefit 747,485 students. The Federal funds being obligated at this time for FWS program operations during the Award Period 1994-95 are \$612,958,362.

# FEDERAL SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANT PROGRAM

Under the Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Program, funds will provide 75 percent of the grants ranging up to a maximum of \$4,000 for each academic year of undergraduate study awarded by participating institutions of postsecondary education to students who are eligible for the program. The institution provides the remaining 25 percent. This schedule contains approval of a total of 4,038 institutional recipients which are estimated to benefit 931,603 students. The Federal funds being obligated at this time for FSEOG program operations during the Award Period 1994-95 are \$577,596,272.

# FEDERAL PERKINS LOAN PROGRAM

Under the Federal Perkins Loan Program, institutions make low interest loans to needy enrolled students. Federal funds will provide 75 percent of the new capital contributions to an institution's Federal Perkins Loan Program Fund and an institutional contribution will provide the remaining 25 percent. (Under the Program's expanded lending option, the Federal and institutional shares of the total new capital contribution are 50 percent each.) This schedule contains approval of a total of 2,479 institutional Federal Perkins Loan authorizations which are estimated to benefit 812,180 students. The total Federal funds being obligated at this time for Federal Perkins Loan program operations during the Award Period 1994-95 are \$157,107,442. An institution in this report with an authorized Federal Perkins Loan Level of Expenditures, but no Federal Perkins Loan Federal funds, is authorized to use cash in its Fund from borrower repayments and other resources up to the amount shown.
