FUNDING AWARDED TO CONTINUE PROJECTS

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- U.S. Rep., Nick J. Rahall (D-WV) announced today the award of \$150,000 for West Virginia to continue its Rural Development through Forestry Demonstration Projects begun in 1990.

In 1991, West Virginia is among four demonstration projects states and 19 special emphasis projects to receive over \$1,900,000 from the USDA Forest Service's Rural Development through Forestry Initiative. These funds are targeted towards projects that use forest resources as a catalyst for economic development and diversification.

Specific projects carried out as part of these demonstration projects show how local economies are diversified through the use of locally available forest resources and labor, while also maintaining or improving the quality of those same forest resources.

"The projects made accesible through this funding advance both the economical and ecological facets of our infrastructure," stated Rahall.
