MALCOLM H. KERR SCHOLAR FOR THE 1991 SUMMER PROGRAM NOMINATED

WASHINGTON, DC. -- U.S. Rep. Nick Rahall, (D-WV), is pleased to announce that Mr. Philip King, of Matewan, West Virginia, has been selected as a 1991 Malcolm H. Kerr Scholar.

Mr. King, a Matewan resident, will be spending the summer in Egypt and Tunisia to broaden his knowledge of international affairs and cultures. The program's focus is about 40 percent academic, including daily Arabic language lessons, 30 percent briefings and meetings, and 30 percent leisure meant to foster acquaintances with host country's nationals.

Mr. King was chosen by the Huntington Local Nominating Committee, of which Representative Rahall is Chairman. "The Summer Scholar Program was designed by the National Council on US-Arab Relations to give young Americans the opportunity to project themselves into the daily life of an Arab and Islamic society." said Rahall.

Dear Mr. King:

I am pleased to inform you of your selection to participate in the 1991 Malcolm H. Kerr Scholars Program in Arab and Islamic Studies this Summer. On behalf of the National Selection Committee, I convey our heartiest congratulations. We were most impressed by the high quality of the finalists.

Let me take a moment to inform you about some of the highlights of the program you'll experience this Summer. The Kerr Scholars Program is designed to afford young Americans the opportunity to project themselves academically, perceptually, and emotionally into the daily life of an Arab and Islamic society. About 40 percent of the Program's focus will be academic, including daily Arabic language instruction and lectures on historical and cultural topics. Another 30 percent will include meetings and briefings with specialists in different fields and visits to significant industrial, cultural, and governmental institutions. The remaining 30 percent can be used in a variety of ways, but most choose to engage in individual activities designed to foster acquaintances with host country nationals.

The Kerr Scholars will be joined on the program by a group of professors from colleges and universities from several states. The professors have been selected to participate in the Joseph J. Malone Faculty Fellows Program in Arab and Islamic Studies. Kerr Scholars and Malone Fellows will be together for most lectures and visits to cultural and historical sites, but will have some separate activities.

We realize that you and your parents might have concerns about U.S. citizens travelling in the Middle East. <u>The National</u> <u>Council continues to monitor events closely in the region before</u> <u>and during the period of the Program</u>. We have informed our American embassies in both Egypt and Tunisia about the programs and they are supportive, as are State Department officials. As the Kerr Program brochure and each of the National Council's Annual Reviews since the program began in 1984 have indicated, Presidents Reagan and Bush could hardly have provided a more upbeat endorsement of the Program. The same can be said for the American Ambassadors and Embassy staff in both countries where the program is conducted. Please be assured that the National Council will err on the side of caution in matters relating to your safety. We would be most happy to discuss these matters with you and your parents at any time.

All Scholars must attend a pre-departure orientation session commencing the afternoon of Sunday, June 23 in Washington, D.C. Your international flight will depart the afternoon of Friday, June 28, arriving the afternoon of the following day. You are scheduled to return on July 28.

As indicated in the literature accompanying the application form, you are required to provide for your own round-trip air fare and ground transportation to Mount Vernon College, the site of the orientation program in Washington, D.C., and one meal a day during the in-country program. Your return flight should be booked from New York as international flights will return to JFK.

Please indicate your acceptance or declination of the Scholar Award in writing to Ms. Alison Richards, Kerr Program Coordinator, by March 15. If we have not heard from you by that time, we will award your place in the Program to one of the alternates. You will be notified of your country assignment in late March. We also ask that you contact the chairperson of your Local Nominating Committee to offer your assistance in raising the required \$1250 from your community.
