

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WEST VIRGINIA WATER PROJECTS PASSED BY THE HOUSE NEXT STOP: THE PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- U.S. Rep. Nick Rahall (D-WV) today joined the majority of his colleagues in approving the Fiscal Year 1992 Energy and Water Development Appropriations Bill providing \$21.8 billion for the Army Corps of Engineers water projects, the Interior Department's Bureau of Reclamation, and agencies such as the Applachian Regional Commission (ARC).

Under the bill, the ARC would be funded at \$190 million, \$90 million more than proposed by the Administration. The bill also includes funding for the work the corps is performing in Kenova, West Virginia and is proposing for Barboursville, West Virginia. Also included is \$1 million for a watershed project on Fourpole Creek near Huntington. Among other Corps projects in West Virginia to receive continued funding:

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TITLE IV-INDEPENDENT AGENCIES APPALACHIAN REGIONAL COMMISSION

Amendment No. 54: Appropriates \$190,000,000 as proposed by the Senate in-stead of \$170,000,000 as proposed by the House.

The conferees agree that a total of \$22,700,000 is provided for corridor construction in Alabama; a total of \$16,300,000 is provided for corridor construction in Mississippi; and a total of \$58,000,000 is provided for corridors G and H in West Virginia.

The conferees support the Senate proposal to provide \$400,000 to continue the tourism development work being conducted in accordance with Senate Report 101-378 accompanying the fiscal year 1991 appropriations bill.

TITLE V-GENERAL PROVISIONS

Amendment No. 55: Deletes House lan-guage stricken by the Senate which prohibits the expenditure of funds to implement the Chief Financial Officers Act of 1990.
