Little Man Is Hit Again

President Nixon's decision to allow oil companies to increase the price of fuel oil, ultimately to be paid by the consumer, is something we find hard to understand and accept.

The argument goes, as we read it, is that if the price charged by oil companies for fuel oil is increased, then the oil companies will be much more willing to divert a greater percentage of the petroleum from gasoline to fuel oil.

This is all very fine for the oil companies, to pile even higher profits on top of their record-high profits already being shown, but how about the individual consumer who has to pay the bill?

The average citizen is being asked to make sacrifices by keeping his thermostat down in home and by driving slower on the highways and by limiting his electric lighting use. There is nothing wrong with that but why not make the oil companies sacrifice something also instead of merely giving them a chance to make still more money?

President Nixon supposedly has almost dictatorial powers in these matters so if he is going to tell the average citizen what he has to do in the way of sacrifice, he should also direct the oil companies to allocate the percentage of petroleum needed into the fuel oil category without raising the price.

We have always been a great believer that big business must operate at a profit if the nation is to have full employment but this latest move sounds a little ridiculous.
