Dear Mr. Staggers:

It is with grave concern that we communicate with you on matters relating to recent developments of the energy crisis and the general increase in the cost of living.

Not often do I disclose impatience nor become strongly voiced in matters that concern me personally. My income is sufficient that the escalation of food and fuel costs can be absorbed without great hardship. I do, however, think there is a need for price controls to be established and continued until this very serious problem of inflation is at least partially arrested.

We represent auxiliary and school service personnel which number over 13,000 in West Virginia. Enclosed is the breakdown of their categories of employment and average annual salaries for the 1972-73 school year. We often wonder what kind of a living they can provide for themselves and their families on such incomes.

We need not tell you how much the price of food essentials have increased with the lifting of price controls. At present, some consideration is being given to adding as much as a thirty cents $(30\,\mbox{¢})$ tax per gallon of gasoline. It is our belief that to impose such a burden on our people would all but chase them off the highways. The lifestyle of those who could afford such a tax increase would not be altered at all.

We have permitted large oil companies to develop a complete monopolization of gasoline and oil products. They control every operation of the industry from drilling to retailing. Although the American people will benefit eventually, the Alaskan pipeline, being financed by public funds, will no doubt be of great monetary benefit to the oil companies.

The West Virginia School Service Personnel Association will join with others in an all out effort to put matters such as the above in their proper places in due time.
