My dear Senator Kilgore:

In reply to your letter of May 15th, 1944, I am enclosing a report showing a comparison of the oil burning vs. coal burning vessels. From this you will see that under present day circumstances the burning of coal aboard ship is not very attractive. This picture may, of course, change in the distant future and in this respect the Commission is keeping abreast of the various developments so that should this change be dictated, either by economic consideration or through conservation of our natural resources, we will be in a position to design vessels burning coal instead of oil. However, this is not considered to be very probable.

In connection with your specific question as to the number of Victory ships that have been constructed as coal burners, you are advised that none of these vessels are so constructed, for, in addition to the economic side of the question, the military consideration prohibits the use of coal on these vessels.
