Three Officers Are Convicted In Wright Case

CINCINNATI.—(AP)—A military court today convicted three AAF officers of neglect of duty in inspection at the Lockland plant of the Wright Aeronautical corporation and sentenced them to be dismissed from the service.

The three however, were cleared of charges of perjury and conspiracy to defraud the government.

The three were Lt. Col. Frank C. Greulich of Detroit, former chief inspection officer for the material command, Maj. Walter A. Ryan also of Detroit, former central states inspection officer and Maj. William Bruckmann, Cincinnati, former resident officer at the plant.
